Proposed Housing Development at Oaktree Avenue

Local residents living near the Proposed Development Area recently received notice that the plans were due for consideration by Northavon District Council Planning Committee Copies were available for inspection at the Council Offices during office hours and comments had to be submitted by 3rd July


This confirmed rumours which have been circulating for the past few months and it now transpires that the development will consist of 42 Council Houses and a two-storey block of 8 flats, to be built in two stages

This area has been used by local residents for recreation purposes, and it has been understood that part of it was to be set aside for play area. This seems essential as the existing recreation ground can only be reached by crossing the main road.

The plans however, showed no provision for such a play area, and alarmed by this, a representative group of local residents visited Mr. Higgins, our District Councillor, to seek his assistance in putting forward this objection, and further letters were sent by individual residents

At the time of going to press we are unsure of the Planning Committee's decision, but hope to keep you informed in further issues

New Village Hall Proposals




PROPOSED SOCIAL CENTRE

Although there is still an economic squeeze on government spending, application for grant towards the new project has been made by the Hall Management Committee

The proposed building is a modified Type 3 Reema building to be built from precast concrete panels, the external walls being of a light grey stone aggregate to blend with the present buildings in the village

The facilities provided by the new building are a Foyer and main hall including a stage, (seating capacity approx 250), two spare rooms, adequate toilet facilities, a kitchen and a lounge area. The total cost of the building is £47,170 added to this is the cost of the central heating, car park, equipment and landscaping making the total cost of the project £58,434.

The Hall Management Committee feel that with the enthusiasm and effort being shown towards the project by villagers that it will be successful in starting this project in 1977. The Committee also wish to thank everybody involved in helping to raise the £15,000 that has enabled grant application to be made.



These are only preliminary proposals and it is hoped that the final plans will include a lounge area with a permanent bar

Pucklechurch Revel 1976

But it never rains on Revel Day

The weeks of preparation that went on before The Revel were without doubt well rewarded. The Revel week managed to raise a profit of over £1000, which is to go to The New Village Hall Building Fund.

Traditionally, farmers seem to joke that they always wait until Revel Day to do their Harvesting, as they can usually guarantee a hot June day. Unfortunately, tradition was broken this year as 19th June turned out to be a down-pour day. The Pucklechurch people resigned themselves to this situation, and went ahead to line up the Floats (appropriately named) and Parade around the village in gallant spirit. This "The Show Must Go On" attitude was admired by the organisers, but reluctantly they still decided to call things a day after the Floats and Fancy Dress were judged. It was announced, with fingers crossed, that Revel Day would be held the following day on Sunday 20th June.

Meanwhile, the riding events were held in a barn at Marsh Farm, Soggy but Sucessful — The week got off to a flying start on the 13th with an Open Air Service on the Recreation Field, when there was a marvellous turn out to listen to the Band and sing along to the selected Hymns. In his short talk, Rev. Cramb mentioned that he hoped Revel Week would be well responded to, and that the weather

holds out for the week. Perhaps if he had spoken just a little louder, his wishes would have held our right until the end of the week, as certainly everything else was granted overwhelmingly, starting off the following day with the Beer Festival.

People flocked in their hundreds to have a taste of at least one of the eight varieties of Real Ale provided at Pucklechurch House, the venue. The turn out was so staggering that well over a hundred people had to be let down, as the gardens were overflowing with folk. These were catered for the next night, when a really successful Folk Evening was held. The Artists found it a struggle at first, to be heard over the drinkers who were only making up for lost time the night before, when there was a tremendous wait for peer. In time it all quietened down, and the varied selection of Singers were much appreciated.

The Revel just seemed to take care of itself, with one event after another bringing entertainment and pleasure to the Village. The pram race went down a treat as it was very well turned out by both entrants and spectators. This alone managed to raise £100.

The Picture Display, Lads V Dads Football, Wrestling, Disco, and Ladies v players cricket, all helped to fill the Programme, and after the Saturday Dance, all that was left to do was complete the week on the Sunday. This happened and the stalls, sports, teas, and games were held as normal Luckity, the Kite demonstration took place, so there was even entertainment.
