PARISH COUNCIL

At the May meeting of the Council Mrs J Bailey was re-elected to serve as Chairman for the ensuing year. Mr A Hall was re-elected to serve as Vice Chairman.

The old equipment shed on the Recreation Field has now been removed, there may be a delay in erecting the new shed as the Parish Council has received a request from Northavon District Council to use the site for their equipment compound, store shed, as they would soon be commencing remedial work on the houses in Hill View.

The Parish Council is concerned over the continued use of the gap in the fence of the Hall car park, as this is a dangerous practice. The Council repaired the gap, but the wire was taken down and stolen within 24 hours. To continue replacement of the wire will prove a costly item.

Part of the cricket square was dug up recently - the mind boggles at the intelligence of youths who carry out such acts of vandalism, especially when one remembers that the square is prepared voluntarily by members of the Cricket Club.

The Parish Council has written to Northavon District Council objecting to the new Council Offices being built in Thornbury, which is not very central or easily accessible.

The Council has also written to Northavon D.C. objecting to the possible sale of land in Oaktree Avenue for "low cost houses".


Northavon District Council has agreed on ways to improve and modernise the Council houses in Main Road and Cattybrook Road, Shortwood. The Officers of the Council will visit each resident in the near future and discuss the various choices with them. Work should start in the autumn, but I hope that the water main in Cattybrook Road will be connected to the houses in the very near future.

I have now been on Northavon District Council for just over five years! On the whole I think that the Council is well run and fairly open about its business, but recently they have refused to support the Freedom of Information Campaign. There are some Council which operate in a very secretive manner (Northavon is NOT one of them) but I think that we should all support more access to information at all levels of Government.

Northavon are in a dreadful hurry again! The Council has approved a "Development Brief" for Patchway Common. Nearly 1,000 acres of land and a potential population of 20,000! All this has been approved before there is any evidence that there is a need for such a huge development. The Avon Structure Plan has not yet been approved by the Secretary of State and he MAY not agree to it!

There have been many complaints about grass cuttings being left all over footpaths when the Council cuts the verges and grassed areas. At present they are doing an experiment on how feasible (and how expensive) it would be to collect cuttings. Let us hope that the experiment works!

BILLY GRAHAM VISIT

We have just come to the end of Billy Graham's visit to Bristol. Some people may have been indifferent to his coming, but many made a conscious decision for whatever reason to go, or not to go to the Stadium. I have heard some, including some Church people wondering why we need an American to come here as an Evangelist. I feel his nationality is irrelevent. He came as a Christian and long before he even got here, the fact of his coming did more to unite our churches, and help individual churches grow within themselves, than anything else for many years.

The overwhelming feeling of Christian unity within the stadium, of people united by their acceptance of Christ in their lives, was strengthened by the knowledge, of which Billy Graham spoke, that millions of Christians elsewhere in England and throughout the world had been made aware of the gatherings in Bristol and were thinking and praying for us.

Several groups of mixed derominations and non Christians went along from Pucklechurch, and there must have been many of these who were glad to be together with people from other churches. Being a very lapsed Anglican, and finding a set church service very difficult to relate to, I tried earlier on this year to find a fellowship group in the village. There may well be groups, but I did not know where to find one, and ended up in Clifton, but that is a long way from home.

I know there will be nurture groups for people referred from the stadium, but it would be wonderful to have house groups in the village led by mature Christians, where both non-Christians and Christians of any denomination could meet up, talk and share a love of God. So much of the joy of Christianity must be lost when it means only a weekly visit to Church. There must be others who would enjoy the fellowship of a small discussion group.

So much has been gained over the last few months, it would be sad if that which has been gained did not grow.

It is illegal for dogs to roam if they do not have a collar and lead. Chipping Sodbury police advised me that stray dogs without a collar should be seized and taken to the nearest police station. (Shortage of manpower prevents the police from collecting them.)


Stray dogs are obviously a menace - fouling indiscriminately, emptying bins, running in packs (one lady reported <u>five</u> dogs together!). Only yesterday I deposited my two small children on the floor in the back of the car, doing an emergency stop to avoid a large black dog in the road.

I would like to appeal to all dog owners to not allow their dogs to roam wild. Another story reported to me is of children teasing these stray dogs - before long it is inevitable that one of those children will be savaged.

No they should not tease the dogs, but the dogs should not be roaming wild. It is illegal. Other dog owners have also complained because they are bothered by stray dogs whilst out exercising their own dogs.

There is probably no more than a dozen dogs that stray - you know if yours does. In an attempt to curb this problem the Pucklechurch News is willing to publish descriptions and names of dogs reported straying. One reported to me today was a black labrador named Jake. Jake - in your box or you'll end up in a police station!
