This fund was a contribution towards the cost of building the original Miners Institute to which miners paid ld (one penny) per ton of coal produced. This man's photograph will shortly be hung in the new Social Club as a reminder of the past.

During the demolition of the old village hall I have been wandering around the foundations hoping to find anything that might be of interest. But there did not appear to be anything coming to light except one little wooden engine. Then when the fellows started to demolish the toilets they found some old newspapers and parts of a Church magazine which listed church services, wardens, Sunday School teachers, District Councillor and the Parish Councillors of the year 1934. Papers included the Evening World, Western Daily Press (when you could buy a brand new 1934 car for about £250), and all the Bristol area cricket team results - very interesting to us older ones.

PUCKLECHURCH PARISH COUNCIL

The fence adjacent to the car park on the Abson Road has now been renewed as far as the entrance to the car park. It is planned to erect a similar fence continuing around to the entrance to Hill View adjacent to the Scout Hut, the area would then be landscaped.

'Dog Notices' have now been erected appealing to dog owners not to allow their dogs to foul the recreation fields and play areas - it was observed that this nuisance had now somewhat abated. Broken glass was again causing problems around the children's play areas. The Parish Council appeal to parents to stress to children that this is a very dangerous practice - bottles should be deposited in the litter baskets. Parkfield play area had recently been tidied up and the broken seats would be repaired in the near future.

The question of using the disused school building for organised youth activities under supervision was now being considered by the County Legal Dept.

The Parish Council are endeavouring to have the road at Bridge Road, Shortwood repaired, but were having great difficulty in discovering which authority was responsible for this work. A letter had been sent to John Cope MP seeking his help in the matter. Following the inclement weather many pot holes are causing problems on roads in the Parish. The County Council would be repairing these in the near future.

A letter had been received from Stoke Gifford Parish Council asking the Parish Council to consider supporting them in their objections to a Planning Application by Bristol Rovers FC to establish a sports stadium complex at Stoke Gifford. The Parish Council decided that the area was too remote from Pucklechurch for the opinion of the Parish Council to carry any weight, also it would not be in order to comment on Planning Applications which affected another Parish. A further Planning Application was considered by the Council which involved a Petroleum Storage Terminal on the Westerleigh Railway Sidings. The Parish Council were of the opinion that any industry which would employ some 70 personnel is to be encouraged - in view of the present employment situation - but the Council were concerned over the extra traffic which would be involved and the inadequacy of the roads in this area - the area is also in the Green Belt.

It was decided to enter the Best Kept Village Competition 1985.

The Council agreed to consider giving a grant towards the cost of a new floor in the Scout Hut. It also agreed to give a grant towards a Playscheme during the August School Holidays.

TOWER PLAYGROUP

Although the weather outside has been so chilly, spring has certainly come to Tower Playgroup, in a flurry of activity. Even though this half term has been so short, the children have produced vases of paper flowers, and decorated clay bowls in honour of Mother's Day. Easter Bunnies, chicks and chocolate nests have been much in evidence. Added to this, they have found time to complete activities based on shape, colour and "buttons and fastenings". Great bargains have been available at the Tower Playgroup "shop" where virtually any grocery item was available priced 1p to 10p. Parents and children worked together to prodcue a successful Easter Fayre and Easter Bonnet competition. Fund Raising events in the future will involve a sponsored brick build and a jumble sale. We look forward to next term and better weather, for a whole series of outings and excursions.

POTHOLES - the nasty cold weather we had during the winter, has left the roads in a pretty terrible state. The County Council is doing all it can to deal with the worst ones, but I am afraid that we are all going to have to be patient! If there are any really dangerous ones then ring the Parish Clerk Roy Wiltshire (2872).

COUNCIL OFFICES - Northavon District Council has finally decided to build new Council Offices in Thornbury on the edge of the Conservation area. The voting was extremely close - 28 against 26 in favour of the development. There were two Councillors absent and both of them were known to be opposed to the scheme. Still, that is democracy and we are going to have to get used to having the "centre" of Northavon at Thornbury.

AVON STRUCTURE PLAN - Some months ago I reported that the Secretary of State for the Environment was proposing to take Lyde Green, Emersons Green and Vinney Green out of the Green Belt. Many of us opposed this amendment to the Avon Structure Plan, and despite the fact that we were assured that the final Plan would be published in March 1985 - nothing has appeared. Meanwhile Kingswood District Council is going to prepare a "Development Brief" for the whole area BEFORE THE MINISTER HAS DECIDED WHAT HE IS GOING TO DO!
