LETTER



As a lot of people may have noticed, this village seems to be sadly going down hill rapidly. These 'so called' parents allow their children to roam around the Village Hall, estate underpass, Fleur-de-Lys public house and Church porch vandalising property, using abusive language and playing radios so loudly meaning only to annoy. Many of these children who hang around are of an age when there is plenty to do that is worthwhile. Surely their parents should take some interest in their development. The time of night I am talking about is when these children should be supervised by an adult anyway, in fact if not, they should be at home.

The language, which seems to be quite acceptable nowadays even when talking to adults, is appalling and so are their manners and morals. I recall back to the Revel Fun Night, when a girl well under the legal age was making a particular spectacle of herself on the Recreation Field. I wonder if her parents know of her 'recreation'. Not one adult male tried to intervene when youths rode around on motorbikes on the Recreation Field weaving between young children. What is the matter with you men, are you frightened of them? It was left to one woman on the Committee who spoke to the youths, but without much success.

In my humble opinion it is the fault of the parents who fail to instil any discipline in the lives of their children. They only seem to want them out of the house and out of the way, no matter what the consequences. Why they bothered to have children in the first place I'll never know. Surely not just for the family allowance! When these young thugs grow up their parents will be to blame when they start on the path to Borstal and eventually prison.

If you know this applies to your neighbour, please show them a copy of this letter, as they are probably not the type of people who would bother with the Pucklechurch News or care what goes on in the village. Have you the guts to do it? If these yobs are given an inch they will take a mile. Let's stand up to them and not allow them to dictate to us how we live our everyday lives.

I realise that some of my views may be controversial, but I am sure my letter will be printed because I feel positive that I speak for the vast majority of this fine community. Let's stop pussy-footing around. Fortunately, my letter only applies to a minority of parents.

For obvious reasons I remain anonymous as I am a mother with children for whom I 'CARE'.


PARISH COUNCIL

Following enquiries by the Council, Northavon District Council had supplied paint for painting a mural on the underpass. This has certainly improved the look of the underpass, but it has already been defaced. The Parish Council had given a grant of £275 towards the holiday Playscheme, and it is understood that the Scheme was very successful.

The Parish Council's application to make use of the disused school building for Youth Club activities is still being considered by Avon County Council's Legal Department.

Play Equipment - Following a review of childrens play equipment, the swings at Parkfield play area and the Slide on the Recreation Field have been taken down for safety reasons. Both items will be replaced in the Spring, together with new baby swing seats and chains.

BLANKET SQUARES



On behalf of "Save the Children" I would like to thank all the people who have been sending me knitted squares. So far, I have received two completed blankets, 303 knitted squares and four knitted vests.

If you would like to help all those famine disaster children of Africa here is the pattern again:

Blanket Square: using D.K. wool and no.8 needles, cast on 36 sts. Knit 56 rows, or knit until square is formed. If you only have thin wool, knit with two strands together.

<u>Crochet Vests</u>: oddments of bright colours in either 4 ply or D.K. Size 4.00 hook.

Front: Make 56 chain. I double crochet in 2nd chain from loop and all the way along (55 sts). Continue in double crochet in bands of 4 lines, changing the colours for each band, until work measures 8½". Same for Back.

Cast on 17 chain for sleeves, either side, and crochet until sleeve depth is 4". Join side and sleeve seams, leaving about 8" neck opening.

I also have patterns for knitted vests and jumpers if you would like one. Please send your knitted squares, vests and blankets to Marion Thorn, 79 Westerleigh Road, Pucklechurch (Abson 3528) and I will pass them on to "Save the Children". The next shipment will be at the end of September.

DISTRICT COUNCIL REPORT - George Conrad

Paying for Holiday Play Schemes

Congratulations to all those involved in organising the Pucklechurch Playscheme in the Village Hall. It was obviously a great success and unfortunately they had to turn some children away on some days! Everyone sees these schemes as a useful service and many years ago Northavon decided to start a grant scheme to help pay for them. This year they set aside $\pounds 4,000$ which enabled the District last year to pay 40% of the costs of each playscheme in the District. This year, however, there were many more Playschemes organised and Northavon found that it would have overspent the budget by £1,000 if it had paid 40% again. As a result, the grant from Northavon was cut to 30%. We tried to increase the budget allocation by the necessary £1,000 from reserves, but unfortunately this was turned down. We shall try to increase the amount of money available next year.

The Waiting List for Council Houses & Bungalows

There are 8 people on the waiting list for houses in Pucklechurch and 18 on the waiting list for bungalows. I get many enquiries about how people are allocated Council houses or bungalows, so I shall try to explain.

When a house becomes vacant (which is not very often) it is allocated to whoever is on the waiting list, who has the greatest number of 'points' and who has the greatest housing need. The first priority goes to people who the Council have to house BY LAW. These include homeless people and those who live in tied agricultural houses. Sometimes these applicants get in before people who have been on the waiting list for years.

When a bungalow becomes vacant there is usually a time before the keys are actually returned to the Council, then the bungalow is cleaned and re-decorated if necessary (that takes some time as well!). When the bungalow is ready the Lettings Office at Northavon and I look at the waiting list, Many factors are taken into account - how long the person has been on the list, what sort of conditions do they live in at present, and perhaps most important of all, are there any medical reasons why they should be rehoused. All these factors are equally important and ocasionally someone who has not been on the list very long, gets rehoused because of medical reasons or because they live in dreadful conditions (outside toilet etc). The Lettings Office and I try to be as fair as possible, but inevitably there will be people who are disappointed. Until the Council builds more bungalows in Pucklechurch, this will be a perpetual problem.

Storm in a tea-cup

At present the staff who work for Northavon D.C. do not have any canteens at either of the offices,

but there are vending machines in the offices which dispense tea, coffee etc at a nominal charge. This year the Council will have to subsidise these machines to a total cost of £2,870. It has been agreed by the Council, that in the new offices when they are completed, the staff will be provided with FREE vending machines to dispense Filter coffee, real tea or chocolate. It is <u>estimated</u> that this service to the staff will cost £13,000 at present day prices. Now, don't get me wrong - I want the staff at Northavon to have decent working conditions, but free coffee or tea, and as many cups as you like is open to abuse. There are very few, if any, public bodies that allow the staff free tea or coffee the N.H.S. does not! We cannot spend an extra £1,000 on Playschemes, but we can spend £10,000 on coffee!! This really is going to be a waste of ratepayer's money.

SUMMER HOLIDAYS PLAYSCHEME

After a break of about 10 years a Playscheme was restarted in the village. It was held for a fortnight in August between 10am and 1pm.

It proved very popular with the children who arrived every morning. The bad weather probably helped the attendance figures but it also meant that we were unable to have as many outdoor activities as we had planned.

We used the Meeting Room for painting, badge making, collage, hair colouring and face painting. The Womens Institute took over the room one day and helped the infants to make place mats, decorate small cakes and make sandwiches for a Toys Tea Party.

The main hall was used for keep fit, snooker, table tennis, swingball, giant draughts, a film show, trampettes and various other amusements.

Some of the older children went to the underpass, under supervision, and painted a mural on the walls. It was a splendid effort and it was very sad to see how quickly their work was spoilt by the graffiti writers.

On a happier note we would like to thank all the adults, the Scouts and the Guides who gave their help to make the Playscheme a success.
