Report by Chairman

The Pucklechurch C.A. continues to expand and hopefully improve the facilities at the Community Centre (Village Hall to most of us). Over the next few weeks you should see the area around the Hall improved beyond recognition. The Community Programme from Northavon District Council should be on site doing the landscaping. The C.A. is going to spend £800 planting shrubs and bushes around the Hall to try and make it look more attractive. The labour is being paid for by the Manpower Services Commission (MSC). Can I assure you that there are no tall trees included and the "view" will not be impaired! May I ask everyone to try and keep an eye on the landscaping when it is done, because it will very soon become an eyesore again if we do not look after it. Please let the plants get established so that we can look at the Hall with pleasure for many years to come.

Future projects which are being investigated are: improving the acoustics in the main Hall by changing some of the ceiling tiles; making the Hall more attractive by installing some "lighting panels" on the walls, and finally investigating the possibility of extending the Hall to provide a proper stage. All this is going to cost money and so I hope you will all support the P.C.A. through its sections, users, supporters and social events.

Extract from January's "Gloucestershire & Avon Life" from their 'spotlight' on Pucklechurch.

At the Battle of Dyrham in 577 the district fell into Saxon hands, in which it remained until the Norman Conquest, and until 950 it was royal property with a hunting lodge on the site of the Star Inn, close to what was the great hunting forest of Kingswood. In 946 Edmund, grandson of Alfred the Great and acknowledged as king of all England and overlord of the Scots since 944, was at Pucklechurch celebrating the feast of St. Augustine of Glastonbury. There he spotted and challenged Liulph. whom he had previously outlawed, and in the ensuing struggle Liulph wounded the king mortally before he was himself cut to pieces by Edmund's followers.

to pieces by Edmund's followers.
Edmund was buried at Glastonbury as Edmund the Magnificent, the doer of great deeds, and his successor gave Pucklechurch to the monks of Glastonbury, in whose ownership it remained until John's reign, when it was acquired by the Bishop of Bath and Wells At the Dissolution of the Monasteries it reverted to the Crown, and then passed into private hands. Perhaps the most significant mark on the buildings of Pucklechurch was made by the Dennis family, which built most of the fine old houses with which the village is generously endowed. Most of these were once farmhouses, but the decline in agriculture has meant that they are now private hought and added to larger farms.

been bought and added to larger farms.

As well as being a farming community. Pucklechurch was known in the eighteenth century for its felt hats and the quarrying of coarse black marble, used for fireplaces and gravestones. But its chief industry at this time was coalmining, and this continued until 1936, when the Parkfield pit finally closed. The village has expanded enormously in the past quarter of a century, and the housing estate has brought many new families to live in what was once a very close-knit community.

PANTOMIME TICKETS - DO WE OVERCHARGE?

Pucklechurch Players believe that their supporters may wish to know how their ticket money is spent. The cost of each ticket to adults who saw "Robin Hood" was $\mathcal{S}2$, which is less than the cost of three pints of beer - and far better for you! An evening of laughter (we hope), enjoyed at one of our performances costs less than the average night out.

I have prepared some figures which, I hope, show that the £2 charge is justified. In fact, we would like to build a permanent area for general use of all clubs and societies and which could also provide a stage. You will see that ticket prices are probably too low if funds are to be raised for such a project.

Here are the details of our pantomime income and expenditure since rehearsals began in October:

For every production we need to spend money on items which we will need in future. Thus, some items of expenditure are not directly attributable to the pantomime account, but have been included as they were incurred in staging "Robin Hood". For example, we needed three microphones, extra drapes, curtain track, installation of speakers, stationery, make-up etc and these items will be used in future productions (see Stock Purchase £170.32). The insurance premium of £43 also gives us protection for our other productions.

It is well worth noting that the marvellous script of "Robin Hood" was written by Richard Palmer for Pucklechurch Players and we did not on this occasion have to pay the License fee or for scripts, the total saving being approximately £100.

On the subject of other productions, I should mention that we made a loss of £35 (excluding capital expenditure) or our play "Plithe Spirit" last year.


So I hope I have shown that we need your continued support. Our productions give us a great deal of pleasure which can only be gained if you come and laugh at our foolishness.

Following a letter from the Parochial Church Council the Parish Council have given a grant of £150 towards the upkeep of the churchyard.

The Parish Council is pleased the new tenor bell has been hung in the belfry and look forward to hearing the church clock striking the hours again.

The new children's slider for the Recreation Field should be ordered in the near future, together with new safety seats and chains for baby tots swings. The new swings for the Parkfield Play Area will be ordered at the same time.

The Council will be completing the fence alongside the car park on the Abson Road in the near future, the area will also be landscaped which together will be a great improvement.

The Council has not yet been successful in its endeavours to purchase land nearer the centre of the village for an allotment, the present allotment on the Westerleigh Road being too far out from the Village, the Council has also found that it is not possible to get a water supply for this land.



I am sure that everyone would agree that last summer's playscheme was a great success, and with a daily attendance of 100 children, I think we can assume that there is sufficient demand for another!!

DISTRICT COUNCIL REPORT - George Conrad

Concessionary Travel Tokens

I read in the papers recently that Kingswood D.C. were thought to be mean because they did not increase the value of their tokens from £18 in line with inflation!!! Northavon are again discussing whether they should increase their tokens from the present miserly £6 per pensioner. The present tokens cost the Council about £75,000 per annum which is approximately ½ a penny rate. But there is the additional problem of the de-regulation to the bus service to contend with this year. We have suggested various things which are being investigated: a "Free Day" for pensioners or perhaps a bus pass which would entitle holders to a discount. When you think that all pensioners who live in London get FREE bus and tube travel at any time of the day or night we are particularly badly treated because we choose to live in a rural parish. If you have any ideas please let me know.

Housing Benefit

The District Council administers Housing Benefit which has replaced the old "rate and rent rebates". There is always a hold up with notifying claimants when the benefits change in November. There seems little you can do about this delay as all the claims have to be processed at the same time. Incidentally, you may be interested to know that the Government sets the level of benefits and under Mr N Fowler's "review" of benefits many pensioners will lose benefit. Cuts in Housing Benefit are one of the many proposals in the review. If you would like to know more, give me a ring on Abson 2979.

Refuse Collection

I am sorry for the chaos after Christmas!! The Council is trying to improve its collection service and they changed the collection day after a Bank Holiday which certainly caught me unawares!! I will try and get the changes advertised in the village more extensively next time it happens.

Disposal of commercial waste (from shops etc) has also changed. Businesses have always had to pay for this service, but they now have to buy "stamps" from the Council and stick them on the bins or bags before the dustbin men will take them away. This has caused many problems throughout the District especially where there are flats over shops - because the men cannot distinguish between "domestic" waste and "commercial" waste. On the one hand it seems fair that those who generate most waste should pay most, but on the other hand we charge higher rates on businesses and then charge them for the services that they require! That seems unfair and I have no doubt that there will be considerable debate on the matter. Let me know your opinions - please.

Lyde Green Common

The development of this land between the M4, the disused Yate to Warmley railway line, and Mangotsfield/Downend is now inevitable. Most of the development will be in Kingswood District and they are drawing up a development brief for thousands of houses. I will let you know what happens, but in the meantime keep an eye on the papers - they sometimes know well before I do!
