Issue No.1 - August 1976

May 1979 - Comment from someone receiving a copy of the P.News "It seems to me a worthwhile venture and indicates a fact that often escapes the town dweller - that the village people have more going for them than many townsfolk have."

October 1979 - Gym Club formed.

Spring 1980 - Cancer Research group formed.

July 1980 - quote from Revel Chairman Alan Holder "Revel makes this small village a better place to live in, somewhere special and we all like to think of our homes being special."

September 1980 - "Of course what we really ought to start now that we have the facilities is our own Drama Club ..."

April 1981 - "Good luck to the Sports Clubs who have formed a combined committee to raise funds for the new changing rooms."

<u>September 1982</u> - "We would like to ask you to support the reforming of the Youth Club for which there obviously a need."

September 1983 - Adult Education comes to Pucklechurch

The Milk Race comes through Pucklechurch.

30th October 1983 - 1st Pucklechurch Fun Run

February 1984 - "We're looking forward to the new school buildings opening this term. This long awaited addition to the school facilities will be of great value to children & staff alike."

July 1984 - St Thomas a Becket tenor bell cracked.

9th October - PCA and VHMC merged under the PCA constitution.

1st December 1984 - First function at the PCA Social Club premises at the Village Hall.

1985 - Old Village Hall demolished.

June - 10th anniversary of the Beer Festival..

10th September - new tenor bell arrived.

February 1986 - Rev Josh Hinton retired.

1st Pucklechurch Guides

Our thanks must go especially to two retiring officers: Jim Higgins who has been President for many years and who was one of the members of the Old Hall Management Committee which built the new Community Centre and Fred Cockle who has been Treasurer for 3 years and kept the Hall in the black! Thanks to all who have helped the PCA over the last year.

The new Executive Committee have considered some revised plans for the multi-purpose stage extension. I hope that a decision on whether to proceed with this project will be taken soon so that we can start some serious fund raising.

The audited accounts show that the income from hiring just covers the running costs of the Hall - but there is no surplus which can be used for improving the facilities. The Hall charges are being reviewed at present and will be geared to covering the running costs of the Hall. Any further capital expenditure will have to be funded by fund raising events and grants and gifts!


Some months ago the Executive was approached by youngsters in the village asking for a room which they could use 4 nights a week for social activities. As many of you will know they have been congregating in the foyer of the Hall and on occasions have been rather boisterous! After much soul searching the Executive agreed to let them use one of the Junior Changing Rooms on condition that they paid the standard rent of £3.50 per night and a deposit, to cover any damage. The youngsters found a responsible adult to open and shut the room each night. This arrangement worked well for a few weeks, but then one of the doors was smashed from the door frame and two electrical fittings were damaged.

There was much talk of replacing the door and repairing the frame, but unfortunately this did not happen and so reluctantly the Executive Committee decided to stop letting this facility to the youngsters. Many people in the village have put a lot of hard work into maintaining the Hall in a decent state and we could not see why one section of the community should undo all the hard work put in by others. I appreciate that Pucklechurch is not an easy place to find entertainment for the youngsters but the majority seem to manage. We would like to treat these young people as adults, but we expect them to behave in a responsible manner. There is a fair amount of goodwill towards them and if they re-apply for the room in the autumn the Committee will consider their request seriously - but we will have to be certain that the room will be treated with respect.

Development at The Poplars, Shortwood Road When the original planning application for development at The Poplars was considered by the Parish Council there was considerable concern expressed about the mature trees in the gardens. I was assured by the Planners that there was no need to give the trees extra protection by way of a Tree Preservation Order because the area was in a Conservation Area and the trees were automatically protected. When the bulldozers and felling equipment was moved onto the site late on Saturday evening it appeared highly suspicious and I made enquiries of the District Council on Sunday afternoon. It appears that a supplementary planning application was submitted to the Planning Committee asking for permission to fell the trees at the front of the house because they were destroying the stone wall and to clear the trees from the site of the new flats which were to be built. Neither the Parish Council nor I were aware of this application. Permission was granted by the Planning Committee at Northavon on the Wednesday prior to the trees being felled. Had I known that this application was going to be considered I would have opposed it very strongly because I do not think that the number of trees felled was necessary. I shall attempt to change the system of notification of Parish Councils and District Councillors at Northavon as soon as possible to prevent this happening again. I think that this demonstrates what sort of mistakes can be made when the local people are not properly consulted.

Holiday Play Schemes

Once again there is going to be a holiday playscheme in the village. Northavon District Council has grant aided these schemes for many years thus helping local children to have an organised period of play during the summer holidays. The Council set aside £4,500 in this financial year for grants to Playschemes which was an increase of £500. Unfortunately these schemes are becoming ever more popular and the numbers of schemes are increasing so that this year Playschemes will be grant aided by only 28% compared with 40% two years ago. The more schemes there are, the less money they will get! I tried to get the Council to increase its budget by £500 to allow the schemes 30% but Northavon said that they could not afford that sort of increase! I will try again next year.

Expansion of Leisure Centres

At the same meeting Northavon agreed to spend £1,300,000 (yes that is right - but they could not afford £500 on Playschemes!!) on expanding the facilities at the Yate and Thornbury Leisure Centres. Northavon have agreed to build a bowls hall, satellite Council Offices, offices for the Citizens Advice Bureaux and contribute to an athletics sports facility at Yate and to expand the bowls hall at Thornbury. Believe it or not these facilities will be largely completed by the end of THIS financial year. I am delighted by this expansion in the sporting facilities and hope they will be made good use of.

Northavon Youth Award
