DISTRICT COUNCIL REPORT - Marilyn Palmer

I am to be a guinea pig! Northavon D.C. is taking part in a National Radon survey. Radon is a radioactive decay product of Uranium 238, a material widely dispersed in the earth's crust in low concentrations. When Radon itself decays, solid radioactive materials are produced which attach to dust particles in the air and are easily inhaled, thus exposing the lung. Normally Radon gas will diffuse from the ground direct to the atmosphere where it will be rapidly dispersed and diluted. However, if Radon is released from the ground beneath a dwelling or from materials out of which the dwelling has been built (e.g. granite) it may accumulate within the building. (Here endeth the first science lesson!) 25 detectors will be installed in houses throughout Northavon - including one in my home (not I hasten to add because I've got more dust!!) I will let you know the results in due course.

The long awaited "Rural Areas Local Plan Draft Proposals" have now been published. It has four main functions:

- (a) to develop the policies and general proposals contained in the Avon County Structure Plan (1985) and the Structure Plan First & Second Alterations as they stand for the time being.
- (b) to provide a detailed framework for development control.
- (c) to bring planning issues before the public and to inform owners, residents and developers how their interests will be affected.
- (d) to provide a detailed basis for directing and coordinating public and private development.

Aims of the Local Plan are:

- (a) to make provision for housing requirements and a suitable number and range of employment opportunities.
- (b) to minimise the loss of good quality farmland and the impact of development on agriculture.
- (c) to safeguard the character and appearance of areas of landscape quality, nature conservation and archaelogical/historial importance.
- (d) to maintain and improve the character, and integrity of villages and settlements in terms of their amenity, and services.
- (e) to make provision for and support of appropriate range of education, shopping, social, health and cultural facilities.
- (f) to provide for the safe, convenient and efficient movement of pedestrians, cyclists and vehicles.
- (g) to maintain and improve the quality of the environment in existing built up areas and villages and to require high standards of design in new developments.

- (h) to support increased leisure, recreation and tourist facilities.
- (i) to indicate the extent of the Bristol Green Belt as it relates to the plan area.

This document has now reached the Public Partici-Pation stage.

As far as Pucklechurch is concerned it says the following:

"The Green Belt boundary closely follows the western, northern and eastern edges of Pucklechurch. It is not proposed to revise the boundaries in order to facilitate further expansion of the settlement since there is no Green Belt justification for this. It is an inset in the Green Belt. The boundaries allow for the level of development considered appropriate until at least the end of the century."

"The central area of the village of Pucklechurch containing a scattering of listed buildings, was designated as a Conservation Area in July 1975. The Council will continue its existing policy of encouraging the preservation and enhancement of the area. This will include the refurbishment of older buildings and planting and landscaping particularly in those areas which would benefit by reinforcement of existing natural features e.g. the 'green' at the junction of Westerleigh Rd and Castle Rd, also the perimeter of the recreation ground particularly the area in front of the Community Hall. The Council will seek the removal, and undergrounding of overhead wires etc to visually improve the area."

The Local Plan suggests three areas in Pucklechurch where limited development or in-filling could take place. These are: Oaktree Avenue (adjacent to the Industrial Estate and Back Lane, and also area adjacent to Dyrham View), the Homefield Rd vicinity and the area close to the Remand Centre.

These are draft proposals and this is a consultation document. The Parish Council will bediscussing it at their next meeting. As always I would be interested in hearing your comments.
