
PUCKLECHURCH TWINNING ASSOCIATION


PUCKLECHURCH COMMUNITY ASSOCIATION

PARISH COUNCIL

The Parish Council has contacted the Agents of the estate regarding the large pot holes in the car park of the shopping precint. The County Council has also been informed of various pot holes around the village, including Parkfield Road.



Officials from the County will be observing the traffic congestion at Castle Road during school hours and it is hoped they will arrive at a solution to the problem in the very near future.

The Parish Council is perturbed over the fact that someone has dumped building rubbish on the children's play area at Parkfield. This is an irresponsible and unnecessary act and the Council request that the culprit remove this rubbish without further delay.

Dog owners are still allowing their dogs to foul the recreation field - even around the children's play area! Please think of the children, there are plenty of wide verges and fields around the village where owners can walk their dogs, and the Parish Council appeal for the umpteenth time for dog owners to keep dogs off the field.

The Parish Council has recently given a grant of £200 towards the up-keep of the Churchyard and £100 to the Citizens Advice Bureau at Yate. The Bureau is a voluntary organisation and has given valuable service to Parishioners in the past year.

The sunken graves in the Council Burial Ground have now been filled and re-seeded and the borders have been planted with daffodil bulbs.

DISTRICT COUNCIL REPORT - Marilyn Palmer

Local Plan

In the last issue of P.News I outlined the "Rural Areas Local Plan" proposals for Pucklechurch. On 12th January the District Council's mobile exhibition visited Pucklechurch and about 60 people visited it. Apparently comments were generally favourable. If you have any further comments to make, please send them to the District Council by the end of January.

Travel Tokens

At the last Council meeting it was agreed that concessionary travel tokens should remain at £12 per person - despite a vigorous attempt to get this increased.

C.A.B.

There was also great discussion over the Citizens Advice Bureau, and sadly a proposal that the District Council should increase their grant to the C.A.B. was defeated 28/29 votes. The C.A.B. (a voluntary organisation) is at present facing a financial crisis. Everyone acknowledges that they provide an excellent service, but no-one is prepared to put them on a sound financial footing.

Housing Committee

I was very pleased to accept a place on the Housing Committee when a vacancy arose in December. At present there is a lot of new legislation concerning housing e.g. the Government's White Paper, which will mean wide-sweeping changes, so it is very helpful to be on the Housing Committee where the implications will be discussed in depth.

P.R.C. Homes

The District Council recently carried out a survey of its P.R.C. homes (Precast Reinforced Concrete Dwellings). In Pucklechurch there are two types of P.R.C. homes: Airey homes in Lansdown Road, and Woolaway homes in Poplar Drive.

The test results on Airey homes were quite favourable, but unfortunately this was not the case for the Woolaway homes. Concrete was found to have aerated, thus reducing the protection to the reinforcement, which had consequently corroded.

The Council therefore had to decide what to do about its 80 Woolaway homes. The decision it made was to redevelop two streets in Little Stoke as a pilot scheme, and that the remaining Woolaway homes be approved for possible redevelopment in the light of experience gained.

Poplar Drive has been scheduled for redevelopment in 1989, but in the meantime a lot of questions need answering. I am hoping to arrange a meeting between residents of Poplar Drive and the Housing Dept in the very near future, and will be insisting on full consultation with residents.

NEIGHBOURHOOD WATCH

Two police inspectors, Inspectors Trigg & Leach, attended the Parish Council meeting on 1st December to talk about Neighbourhood Watch Schemes. It is vital to their success that they have the support of the community. For about every 15 houses a contact person is needed. The scheme is started by holding meetings of these contact people and local police. Property marking equipment can be purchased to be lent out, cycle stamping sessions can be held, also talks on crime prevention, security etc. Window stickers are available so that people know that a scheme is in operation, which obviously acts as a deterrent to burglars.

The Parish Council is keen to promote a Watch Scheme in Pucklechurch, but unless there is wide-spread support from villagers, there is no point in proceeding any further.
