Many English find it difficult but great fun, French guests were amazed but in a short time were joining in and having a go although not always understanding what the caller intended them to do. The whole evening turned out to be a wonderful success.

Sunday morning everyone was up bright and early for Twinning Church Service at St. Thomos a Becket. Our guest of honour the Duchess of Beaufort was introduced to the officils of both Pucklechurch Twinning Asssocation and the Euro-Pringy Committee. During the special service wreaths were laid rememberance of those who gave their lives in the two wars. Childern from the local primary school read Twinning prayers and the lessons were read in both English and French. The children the Junior Church sang a French song and also "He's got whole world in his hands".

Official photographs were taken outside the church in bright sunshine and we then walked to nearby Feltham Road where a road sign was unveiled by the Duchess together with two young helpers one English and one French

At 12:30 everyone gathered in the Community Centre for a celebration meal. In all 159 people sat down together in a beautifully decorated hall to mark this important occasion in the lives of the two villages. Speeches were made at the end of the meal by Geoff. Wilcock Chairman of Pucklechurch Parish Council, Trevor Trueman President of the P.C.A. Michel Cerisier Deputy Mayor of Pringy and Madame Lecuyer President of Euro-Pringy. The toast to the future friendship of our two villages was proposed by Nancy Cleevely Chairman of Pucklechurch Twinning Assocation. Gifts were exchanged and a celibration cake was cut by Nancy and Janine.

Our French guest departed at 6:30pm having formed meny new frendships and leaving the villagers of Pucklechurch looking forward to a re-union in Sept.



This year, Pucklechurch was the scene of much activity preparing for the twinning ceremony with the town of Pringy, and the events of Revel were an obvious attraction for our French guests whose visit was planned to coincide with Revel Day itself. Once again we managed to stage a series of successful events which brought fur and enjoyment to all those who were able to attend.

LETTER



It has come to my notice recently that, mingled with the residential homes on the main estate in Pucklechurch are several large lorries and anticulated vehicles parked. Fortunately I don't have to view them very often, but I am wondoring if the people who do, enjoy the experience very much? Do they really enhance the look of the village in general? I very much doubt if anyone would say YES. . . If the people who are forced to stare at the sides of lorries, or have their mooms darkered by their image think they can do nothing about it, or don't know what they can do, then let me give you the following information:

Since June 1994 a new Operators Licensing system was implemented which strengthens the powers of Licensing Authorities to consider the environmental suitability of Operating Centres (where the vehicles are operated from and should return to). Firstly, most goods vehicles with a gross plated weight of over 3.5 tonnes must have an Operators Licence by law To obtain this licence there are many rules and regulations to be strictly adhered to - one of them being that the Operating Centre is environmentally suitable, Now, either the owners of the parked vahicles around Pucklechurch are in possession of an Operators Licence which states that the Operating Centre is "Where they normally park their vehicles in Pucklechurch', which I think is very unlikely, or the drivers of the vehicles park ther in the village because it is convenient to them and the. obviously don't care what they look like to other people. The address below is where information can be sought and complaints made if anyone feels they want to. Remember to give as much information as possible, namely registration number of vehicle, type of vehicle, when and where parked, and the owner of the vehicle if possible The Department of Transport will then make an investigation.

DISTRICT COUNCIL REPORT - Marilyn Palmer

First of all, the results of the National Radon Survey that you've all been waiting for with bated breath! 25 houses in Northavon were surveyed between November 1997 and May 1988. The average level in Northavon was 47 bacquenels per cubic metre of air, compared with a national average of 22. Two houses in Northavon had very high readings - one was 15 times the national average, and another 6 times, and these will be menatored further. My home however, gave a reading of 47 Eqm-2 - the Northavon average, and twice the National average. This is well below the level at which further action is needed.

THE HOUSING PILL - This is the subject of ruch discussion at the moment. Northavon owns 5,500 Council houses and under the Housing Bill a private landlord can make bids to nurchase them. I will shortly be distributing a leaflet to all council house tenants to explain the situation further Morthagen 0.0 has commissioned a large firs of accountants (Coopers & Lybrand) to advise them and they are awaiting their report. The same firm has advised other councils to sell all of their housing off to a Mousing Association PEFOREthe Bill becomes law Northaver D.C. has already set up a Housing Association just in case they decide to do this. Councils who have sold their houses to a Housing Association argue that it is tetter than waiting for a private landlord to come along. Personally, I think that the Council is a good landlerd - it is not motivated ty profit - those in need get priority, not those who can pay I will keep you informed of the decision that Northagon makes.

MIPPIES (Patchford Lane)

I'm sure you must all be aware that we have had various thavellers staying in Batchford Lane, the slip had off Westerleigh Road, for about a year now, in varying numbers. Well, in about April the County of Aven (as the awners of the land) served notices to quit on the hippies, who then sought a judicial neview as they were not satisfied about the validity of the notices to quit. Since then nothing could be done until a decision had been made in the counts. Well, at last there is a date for the hearing - 12 December at St Mary's Count in London. The case is expected to take three days. If the County lose, they will appeal.

E.R.C. HOMES

I have finally been promised a meeting between officers of Northaven D C, and the tenants of Poplan Onive and Homefield Poad. No date has yet been fixed, but it should be in the near future. I hope that tenants will find reassurance from this meeting. Plans for the redevelopment of PRC homes are dependent on the success of a Pilot Scheme at Patchway which has made very slow progress. The scheme is dependent on the cooperation of tenants, and we have been insisting that tenants should be consulted fully at every stage.

The South Beaufort Young Farmers held their AGM on Tuesday 11th October when they elected their new Chairman - Miss M Isaacs, Vice Chairman - Mr N Symms, and the Secretary - Miss T Goaman.
