PARISH COUNCIL REPORT

At their Annual General Meeting, Mr.G. Wilcock was reelected Chairman for the ensuing year and Mr.D.James was re-elected Vice-Chairman.

The Council decided to purchase a park seat for the play area at Eagle Crescent. A new seat will also be erected in the recreation field to replace the old seat adjacent to the swings. In addition, we were very pleased to accept two seats for the Recreation Field, in memory of Tom Moss, former landlord of The Star. The Council are also looking into the question of fitting a type of rubberoid surface to the swings on the four play areas to replace the present concrete bases, this is in the interest of children's safety.

Parish Council meetings have been very lively of late, with up to 30 members of the public attending — this interest is due to the unwelcome travellers in Batchfield Lane. This item has been on the agenda now for two years and everyone involved is thoroughly fed up with it. Unfortunately there is no simple (lawful) answer, but the Council will continue to pursue a solution.

DISTRICT COUNCIL REPORT - Marilyn Palmer

As a member of the housing committee! have spent many hours now at presentations and discussions of the various options open to us in response to the Government's Housing Act. Northavon D.C.'s consultants, Coopers and Lybrand strongly recommend t that we should follow the route of voluntary transfer — i.e. that the Council should volantarily transfer their housing stock to a housing association (which the council may have set up itself, or to an existing association.)

Because of Government legislation this would enable rents to be kept low. The aim of the housing act is to break the monopoly that local authorities have over rented accommodation. If the Council retains the stock, rents are likely to rise dramatically,

Tenants will be asked to vote on which option the council should take. It will be necessary to get a majority vote for the voluntary transfer to take place. Tenants will be fully consulted and given full information before they will be asked to vote. A 'roadshow' and tenants meeting will be held in Pucklechurch in October. I hope everyone eligible will try to attend. I will not be allowed to speak at the meeting, but I will be there and I would welcome your comments.

PLANNING

Much concern has been expressed to me about the planning application submitted by J. Taylor for "in-filling" on Shortwood Road.

I am confident that this application will be rejected as the land is within the Green Belt and outside the village boundary as defined in the Rural Areas Local Plan. I have, of course, added my objections.




